



Years to Completion: Graduating M.Div. Students




Graduating Students' Satisfaction with Program: Ministry Skills, M.Div. Students




Graduating Students' Satisfaction with Program: Ministry Skills, Other Degree Programs




Graduating Students' Measure of Personal Growth: All Programs



Graduating Students' Overall Experience During Program: M.Div. Students




Graduating Students' Overall Experience During Program: All Students






Phd Alumni/ae in 2010




PhD Alumni/ae in 2014



PhD Alumni/ae in 2018




Placement Rates - All MDiv Graduates One Year After Graduation

- 3% withdrew in 2018




Students Taking a Leave of Absence

- 3% in 2018




Students Withdrawn since 2019

Students Withdrawn from CTS Averaging around 15 Students per Year




Number of Graduates

 Graduation numbers are trending upward; the dip in 2020 was due to COVID-19, a year where two ceremonies were needed for students to graduate.




Retention/Completion: MDiv students who began in 2017 36% will graduate by 2022 – 55 students total
