- We are committed, in recognition that social divisions are local, national, and global, to international collaboration among individuals and institutions with similar commitments to our own.



2022 G. Campbell Morgan Preaching Award

The G. Campbell Morgan Award in preaching is awarded to a current Chicago Theological Seminary Master of Divinity student who excels at the work of preaching. The award is in honor of The Rev. Dr. G. Campbell Morgan (DD 1902) who was voted one of the ten greatest preachers of the twentieth century. He was a genius of expository preaching, unfolding the biblical text with rigor, compassion, imagination, and art.

2022 Sanderson Award for Women in Leadership

The Sanderson Award for Women in Leadership was established in 2006 in memory of Judith Parks Sanderson who died in 2004 after a courageous battle with ovarian cancer. Judith Parks Sanderson had an outstanding career as an educational development manager with leadership roles at William & Mary College, Princeton University, and University of Chicago during a time when women in managerial roles were rare as "the glass ceiling" limited opportunity. She planned to assist startup not for profits in their development efforts and wanted to mentor younger women who showed management promise. This annual award is given to an outstanding woman candidate to assist in furthering her career.

Dr. Brad R. Braxton is President and Professor of Public Theology at Chicago Theological Seminary. He is also the Senior Program Advisor for Creative Encounters, Living Religions in the United States, the 2023 Smithsonian Folklife Festival on religious diversity, and the Founding Senior Pastor of The Open Church, an inclusive congregation in Baltimore, Maryland committed to social activism, LGBTQ+ equality, and interfaith collaboration.

He holds a PhD in New Testament studies from Emory University, where he was a George W. Woodruff Fellow, a master's degree in theology from the University of Oxford, where he was a Rhodes Scholar, and a BA degree in religious studies from the University of Virginia, where he was a Jefferson Scholar and a member of Phi Beta Kappa.

Honorary Degree: Elder David Wallace



Elder David Wallace is a Spokane prayer warrior. An elder at Central Seventh-day Adventist Church for 20 years, David has been chairman of the Central Prayer Team, a worship leader, a part of leadership team for the Junior Sabbath School, a greeter, and a volunteer for many Central activities. He is a retired chairman of the Better Living Center and vice president of He's Alive Television. He also was an elder at the Deer Park Seventh-day Adventist Church for 10 years.

He has been Coordinator of the Spokane World Prayer Team, an interdenominational prayer body meeting weekly to pray for the nations and leaders of ministries in Eastern Washington and from around the world, since 2005. He is also part of the prayer ministry each week at the Union Gospel Mission. Elder Wallace is a founding member of the Spokane Fatherhood Initiative, a two-year endeavor devoted to three legs of fathering children. First is encouraging healthy Christian families to become foster care and

adoption families for children in the Washington foster care system. Second, is developing ministry for men in Christian churches. It is important to appeal to men with 21st Century challenges to go forth with the gospel and train other men in discipleship. Third, is developing youth mentorships on training, especially focused on teaching young men how to be men with preparation for Christian adulthood with a healthy hope for their lives and future families.

Following graduation from Texas A&M University, Elder Wallace spent two years in Tanzania, East Africa, in community development in forming the Tanganyika YMCA in the new nation. He continued his community emphasis with the Southern Christian Leadership Conference, organized by Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr. in Chicago, Illinois, beginning while he was a student at Chicago Theological Seminary.

David Wallace was born in Pecos, Texas. A graduate of Pecos High School, he graduated from Texas A&M with a BA degree in History and minors in Political Science and English. He and his wife Cheryl live in Spokane. His sons are Joshua of Scottsdale, Arizona; Stephen with wife Rachel of Redmond, Oregon; and Noah with wife Sabine of Salzburg, Austria.

Distinguished Alumni Awardee: Rev. Sharon Ellis Davis, PhD



Dr. Sharon Ellis Davis is a retired United Church of Christ pastor serving for over 30 years as pastor in various settings. Sharon also served as a Chicago Police Officer for 31 years, working in the patrol division, and as a Criminalist in the Chicago Police Crime Laboratory Division examining crime scene evidence and testified in court as an export witness in the field of Forensic Science. She also served the Department as its first African American female police chaplain, serving officers and their families especially in times when officers are seriously injured or killed in the line of duty until her retirement. Dr. Ellis Davis currently serves as an Affiliated Professor with McCormick Theological Seminary, Chicago, Illinois and Assistant Visiting Professor in Pastoral Leadership and Ethics, Lexington, Kentucky.

Dr. Ellis Davis previously served as a mentor with United Theological Seminary, Dayton Ohio for twelve years, leading over fifty Doctor of Ministry students through their Doctor of Ministry degrees. Dr. Ellis Davis

is a trainer with Faith Trust Institute based in Seattle, Washington providing training and resources to pastors and congregational leaders in healthy church boundaries and safe and healthy churches. She teaches courses such as: Sexual & Domestic Violence; Pastoral Care in Times of Crisis and Trauma; Mass Incarceration and the Criminal Justice System, and Christian Social Ethics. Dr. Ellis Davis is a nationally recognized speaker in the field of domestic violence and sexual violence especially as it relates to issues of race, class, culture, & Gender and other intersections. She is a retired board-certified chaplain with the Association of Professional Chaplains.

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
